

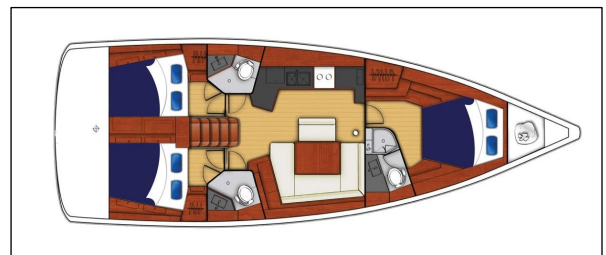


Caribbean Cruising Sailing Course / Vacation in the British Virgin Islands!



Block Island Community Sailing is pleased to offer US Sailing Basic Keelboat, Basic Cruising, and Bareboat Cruising Certification Courses in one of the most fabulous sailing venues in the Americas. Our one-week charter / sailing course features seven days of sailing instruction aboard a chartered 46' luxury monohull sloop sailing from Tortola to Virgin Gorda and back, stopping at some of the most spectacular cruising harbors in the BVIs .

- Onboard accommodations include three private staterooms, each with a double berth, private head, and hot shower. The vessel also features a full galley and main cabin with table seating for 8. Our students can bring spouses or friends who can participate in our local sail-training day sails or enjoy shore side activities (like beaching, hiking, or going on a dive boat tour) while we are out sharpening our sailing skills.
- The charter yacht is fun to sail with dual helms, advanced chart plotter, roller reefing jib, anchor windlass, fold down transom / swimming platform, 12' foot dinghy with a 9 hp



motor, ice box with additional refrigeration, WIFI, phone charge plugs, and an additional hot shower on the enormous swim platform.

- The yacht comes fully provisioned with food and beverages as requested by our participants. Do you have a favorite tropical drink? You got it! Our Itinerary includes stops at Norman Island, Cooper's Island, Brandywine Bay, and Leverick Bay in Virgin Gorda, all scenic harbors which offer casual or fine dining along the cruise route.
- Charter / Sailing Course cost is all inclusive for all activities on the yacht. Travel, lodging, and meals ashore are not included. Cost is approximately \$2,350 per person, based on six participants, depending on the date of the booking and vessels available.
- Charter / Sailing Course departs "The Moorings" our Bareboat Charter base in Road Town, Tortola on Sunday at noon and returns there on the next Sun. at 11 AM.
- The Charter / Sailing Course is hosted by BICS as part of our regular sailing program with US Sailing Certified Cruising Instructor Henry duPont, as your Skipper / Instructor. Henry who has a US Sailing "International Proficiency Certificate" is very familiar with these waters and is on file as an "Expert Skipper" with the Charter Company.
- Successful completion of the US Sailing courses offered will award each student with their US Sailing Basic Keelboat, Basic Cruising, and Bareboat Cruising Certificates. These will qualify our students to get their US Sailing International Proficiency Certificate (IPC) which will qualify them to skipper a bareboat charter, without a professional captain and crew, in most parts of the world.
- All the above comes with a special BICS guide to cruising which tells you what to bring, what to expect onboard, and how to enjoy one of the most memorable sailing vacations available anywhere. This offer is inexpensive because BICS is a nonprofit organization. Comparable live-aboard sailing courses in the BVIs are considerably more expensive.

How to get to the British Virgin Islands

You can fly from Providence, Boston, Hartford or the NYC airports to San Juan Puerto Rico (SJU) and then fly Silver Airways or InterCaribbean Airlines to Beef Island Tortola. (EIS) R/T flights cost Between \$600 and \$1,200.

Prospective Itinerary:

Saturday: Depart PVD, BOS, or BDL airports to San Juan, Take a flight from San Juan to Beef Island Airport on Tortola. Spend Saturday Night in Road Town Tortola. We have been staying at the Village Cay Marina Hotel, which is a mile from the Moorings, for \$177 a night.

Sunday: Morning: Explore Road Town, and shop to get last minute personal items. Lunch at the Moorings Bar and Restaurant in Wickham's Cay II while we provision the yacht. Afternoon: Sail to The Bight, Norman Island. Mooring Ball or Anchor. Explore "the Caves" a spectacular snorkeling site on Norman Island, relax on the boat, or visit Willie T's floating Bar / Restaurant.

Monday: Set sail to Peter, Salt, and Cooper's Island stopping for snorkeling at the best sites. Stop and moor at Manchioneel Bay on Cooper's Island for the night. Cooper's Island Beach Club has a terrific bar and restaurant renowned for its lovely sunset cocktails.

Tuesday: Morning: set sail to Virgin Gorda stopping at the magnificent "Baths" famous for its enormous boulders, caves, tidal pools, a beautiful beach, and great snorkeling. Afternoon: sail a short distance to Spanish Town to reprovision if needed. Continue sailing to North Sound on Virgin Gorda spending the night at our base, the Leverick Bay Resort and Marina.

Wednesday: Spend the day sailing in Virgin Gorda's North Sound. which has dozens of lovely anchorages and terrific attractions such as the Bitter End Yacht Club and Saba Rock Restaurant which has been completely rebuilt since Hurricane Irma. Spend the night in Leverick Bay at our Virgin Gorda base at the Leverick Bay Resort and Marina.

Thursday: Spend the day sailing in Virgin Gorda's North Sound. There are fabulous islands like Mosquito, Prickly Pear, and Eustacia, with lovely beaches, scenic hiking, and beautiful reefs to snorkel on. Stop for a cocktail at Saba Rock, a famous restaurant in North Sound. Spend the night back at our base at the Leverick Bay Resort and Marina.

Friday: Set sail for Marina Cay, near Trellis Bay, for a lively beach side artist's community.

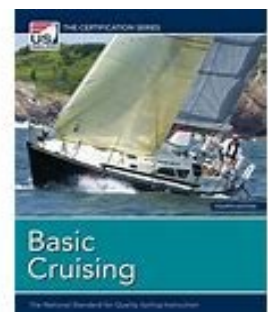
Saturday: Sail to scenic Brandywine Bay on Tortola for our last night aboard.

Sunday: Return our yacht to "The Moorings" in Road Town by 11AM. Take an afternoon flight to Puerto Rico to transition back to the Northeast. Or spend a night in Condado, a beach resort near the San Juan airport in PR to connect with an earlier Monday flight back to the NE.

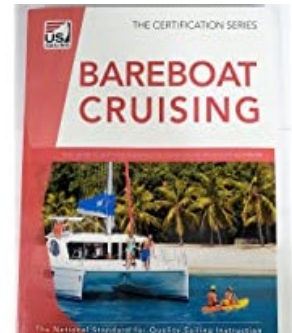
Sailing Course Description

Our US Sailing Basic Cruising and Bareboat Cruising Certification Courses prepares you to sail your own big boat and charter cruising boats, on your own, without a professional captain and crew aboard. Depending on weather conditions and the learning pace of others in your class, the following knowledge and skills are learned and practiced. These follow the curriculum and lesson planning in the US Sailing Basic Cruising, and Bareboat Cruising Course Books. See: [US Sailing Bareboat Cruising Education](#) for more information.

- Planning a cruise including provisioning, itinerary, weather forecasting
- Familiarization with boat layout and sail plan
- Operation of engine, stove, and head
- Routine engine maintenance, and fueling techniques
- Electrical System, including battery and charging systems
- Fresh water system including use and onboard water conservation
- Use and location of thru-hull fittings
- Maneuvering under power and sail with emphasis on safe boat handling in close quarters



- Big boat docking, mooring, and anchoring techniques
- Proper and safe handling of halyards and lines
- Proper and safe use of winches
- Weather forecasts and their impact on cruising route and sail selection
- Sail shape and trim
- Inter-crew communication when trimming sails, mooring, docking, and anchoring
- Genoa roller furling use
- Emergency procedures including steering system failure, grounding, overboard recovery.
- Big boat heavy weather and reefing techniques
- Sailing wing and wing on bigger boats including boom preventer use
- Knot tying proficiency and which knot to use in any application
- Maintaining a ship's log
- Piloting techniques including set, drift and leeway calculations
- Navigation including the use of charts, navigation markers, and GPS navigation
- Rules of the Road
- Coast Guard requirements
- VHF radio use
- Using lights and sound signals including distress sig
- Use of safety harness

Frequently Asked Questions:

Q: Are the charter dates and itinerary destinations flexible?

A: Yes. The BVI cruising itinerary provided above is just an example. Any range of dates, including a 10-day sailing charter which could include Anegada, and Jost Van Dyke Islands, is possible. Check with BICS to for charter yacht availability and rates on your planned vacation schedule.

Q: Do I have to take the sailing proficiency certification courses if I just want a relaxing Caribbean sailing cruise / vacation without any sailing instruction?

A: No, the sailing course instruction is offered to our charter guests who want to learn big boat handling and become proficient as a prospective bareboat charter skippers, at no extra charge. If you only want a relaxing sailing vacation, the itinerary can be adjusted to achieve just that.

Q: What are the live aboard arrangements like?

A: Our charter yacht has three private staterooms each with its own shower and head, plenty of ventilation, personal storage space, USB and DC automobile type charge outlets. The skipper bunks in the settee berth in the main cabin. If you like to sleep under the stars, comfortable cockpit cushions make that possible. On nights when we are docked in a marina slip, AC power is available on board. WIFI is available over the entire charter range through a dedicated hot spot on the yacht. This opportunity allows our guests to experience the charter lifestyle for the first time.

Q: Who selects and prepares the food and beverages onboard?

A: Years of chartering experience guides us to provision the yacht with food and beverage selections which are local, fresh, sumptuous, and completely flexible. BICS will work with each charter party to develop menus, provision the boat accordingly, and assist with the food preparation. On some nights, when we are docked at a resort marina you may wish to sample the casual or fine dining ashore.

Q: What kind of weather can we expect on the Cruise?

A: The weather in the BVIs is remarkably consistent. Daily temperatures: High 83 / Low 75. Mostly sunny with some "puffy" fair weather clouds. Wind E 12-18 kts. Water temp: Feb 77, March 78.

Q: What are the best flights from the Northeast to Tortola?

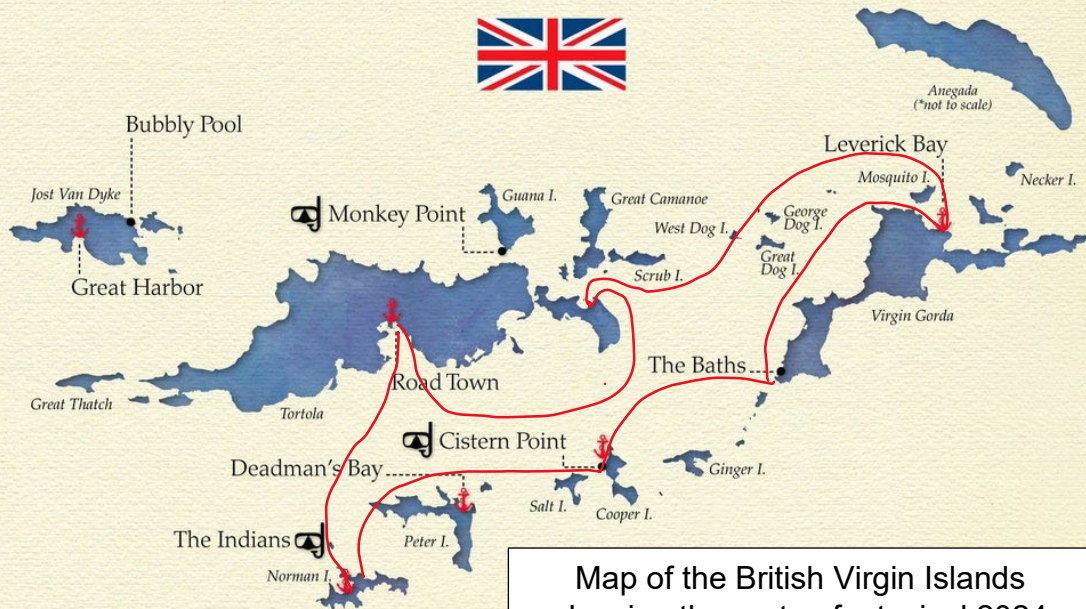
A: The least expensive flights are direct flights from Boston or Hartford to San Juan Puerto Rico, connecting to InterCaribbean Airlines or Silver Airways from San Juan to Beef Island Airport on Tortola for about \$900 R/T.

Q: What are our skipper's qualifications?

A: Henry duPont has been sailing on cruising yachts from a young age and has logged over fifty cruising voyages sailing to local destinations in the Northeast and on blue water sailing voyages to Bermuda, Nova Scotia, and the Chesapeake Bay. Henry is a founding Director of Block Island Community Sailing, holds a USCG 25 ton Master's License, with sailing endorsement, and is a US Sailing Certified Cruising Instructor for teaching: Basic Keelboat, Basic Cruising, Bareboat Cruising and Coastal Navigation courses. Henry has been taking our students on these sail training cruises in the BVIs as well as to local cruising destinations like Newport, RI, Wickford RI, and Mystic CT. He has also worked professionally on clean energy projects in the British Virgin Islands and is very familiar with the charter itinerary waters. He will ensure that your charter experience is safe, educational, comfortable, and fun!
